Brownfields Job Training Program PLC Call – Additional Notes December 18, 2024

The December 2024 PLC Call featured a discussion about what it takes to establish a job training program and develop an effective application for funding, and common mistakes made in grant applications. A successful Brownfields Job Training grant application requires more than just good grant writing skills. Successful applicants get started months in advance by conducting research, identifying community needs, and formalizing partnerships. It is important for prospective applicants to critically evaluate their storyline and identify potential areas for improvement, research needs, and strategies to strengthen their positioning for funding.

During the call, EPA Headquarters staff and Regional Brownfields Job Training Coordinators provided insights about:

Common challenges and mistakes in applications

- Applicants not addressing each threshold criterion of the Notice of Funding Opportunity. If applicants don't address/pass each of the threshold criteria, the application doesn't move on to be merit reviewed.
- Applicants not reading the guidelines carefully and responding to each of the evaluation criteria. Applicants should be sure to review Section V.A. Evaluation Criteria multiple times, which is what EPA uses to score applications. For example, common evaluation criteria that are overlooked by applicants include:
 - Describing how the training program incorporates sustainable practices
 - Providing a detailed description for each training course that will use Brownfield Job Training Grant funds
- Applicants not taking advantage of <u>TAB Providers</u>. TAB Providers can help do preliminary application reviews and connect you with other organizations in your area.
- Common sections that often pose challenges for applicants include those related to describing community need, labor market assessment, training program description/details about courses, partnerships, student recruitment/screening/retention, and program support.

Tips for starting the application process early

- Start with easy initial steps and build momentum.
- Identify employers and community leaders in the area. Interested applicants can use the <u>Brownfields Grant Fact Sheet</u> <u>Search tool</u> to find entities that are conducting brownfields assessments and cleanups.
- Talk with your TAB Provider and EPA Regional Job Training Coordinator and engage them early.
- Engage with nearby cities to see if they would be interested in supporting a job training program or consider being a coalition member.
- Talk with employers regularly and involve them as you develop your program.
- Talk with the community stakeholders early and often. Find community leaders and educate them about the benefits of the program and impact it can have on people's lives.
- Conduct partnership building and get buy-in from local organizations early; it can take a lot of time, but it is one of the most important aspects of a successful program.
